MANUEL ANAYA: DEC. 29, 1913-MAR.24, 2005

The community's eldest member, Manuel Anaya passed away just before Easter. Well over one hundred relatives and friends, some from out of state, attended his Rosario, Funeral Mass, Burial, and lunch at the Community Center – all in Galisteo. Son of Rita and Ventura Anaya, born and raised in the village, Manuel was loved and respected here for 91 years.

He is survived by his wife of 69 years, Clarita Anaya, and sons Nick and wife Corinne, Johnny Anaya and Betty Tabor (all of Galisteo) and his devoted daughter Marta Delgado of Moriarty, as well as many grandchildren and great grandchildren. Another son, Raymond, was killed in an automobile accident on Lamy Hill in 1959.

When he was a very small boy, Manuel Anaya was taken out of school in March to spend months out on the land herding sheep. He and Clarita, who lived next door on the Hill, were married in Pecos in 1935. (The Galisteo church was not open then for months at a time.) Manuel worked for the ATSF Railroad for many years installing ties at Kennedy, Las Vegas, and in Hurley, near Deming.(Clarita moved there with him and they lived in a railroad bunk car fixed up as a home.) Later he became a truck driver, transporting workers in the Lamy Section. Luis Chavez and Lucas Anaya were co-workers. Manuel and Luis were cuates (buddies) and kept an eye on each other; when Manuel took a short nap after lunch, Luis looked out for snakes.

Manuel retired at age 62 but he was always a hard worker. The church was most important to him. He was a longtime *mayordomo* and always had a key so that if others didn't show up he could step in. He and Roman Attenberger did all the plumbing for a restroom at the church, and he always cut the weeds.

When Jean Moya and Linda Anaya were taking Manuel to the medical center in August, they stopped to give him a last tour of Nuestra Señora de los Remedios. "Here's your church," they said. "No, it's not my church, it belongs to everyone," he replied. And then, "Oh, my God, look at the weeds"; they promised to cut them for him.

Johnny remembers going as a boy with Manuel to haul firewood one winter when it was very cold. Johnny was freezing in the truck. When he complained, Manuel said, "If you get out and work, you'll be warm." Pretty soon Johnny wasn't even wearing his jacket. Manuel much enjoyed his trips with Nick to Santo Domingo for cheaper gas, going via Waldo or San Felipe; he would wait for Nick with his work gloves on.



Nick Trofimuk was a good friend of Manuel's and one day he came over and told him "Manuel, your yard is so clean." Then as a joke he came back with one leaf and said, "you forgot this one." The family asked Nick to bring one cottonwood leaf to put on the coffin at Manuel's burial.

Marta recalls that she and her father sang together at church for 30 years and when Manuel had to go to the nursing home for his Alzheimer's, they continued there. She recalls that during World War II, when he worked for a while in San Francisco as a "metal man" for shipbuilding, he came home with two chenille bathrobes for her. When she asked why two, he said, "I never want you to be cold, and I knew I'd never go back there."


At Christmas Manuel loved Marta's eggnog with whiskey -"those drinks that taste really good." After two of them he would
play the harmonica and sing carols. At weddings and parties, he
and Clarita were "the best polka and waltz dancers."

"I was his baby and then when he got sick he was my baby," says Marta. "He was an honest man to the day that he died."

Good news. My fly-catching Say's Phoebe friends migrated in about two days before the big snow. I was so worried they wouldn't be able to find food. But I'm happy to report they retreated south to wait out the cold weather and returned safe and sound a few days ago to start nest building.

A warning to all you little Quail and song birds: There's trouble in Paradise! Some birds actually eat other birds. Disgusting but true. Keep a sharp eye out for the returning diurnal (daytime) predators like the Red-tailed Hawk soaring overhead and the Cooper's and Sharp-shinned Hawks and their stealth attacks around bird feeders. And here's something that will really tweak your beak: With the increase in rodent population from all the moisture comes an increase in Road Runners. When they run out of mice and lizards, they will go for your babies in the nest. Shameless!

On the lighter side, want to have some fun? Try doing some people watching. My favorite spot is on top of the church cross. From this vantage point I can easily observe humans. But frankly I get bored after a few minutes. They all look alike!

Oh Happy Days! The Bluebirds of Happiness are everywhere. Even some Eastern Bluebirds are hanging out with the Western and Mountain Bluebirds right here in Galisteo. It's a wonderful world and I'm proud to bring you this bird's eye view of it all. Hasta La Vista! See you in the funny papers....

GCA REPORT

The March 21, 2005 Galisteo Community Association meeting began with welcoming new members and an acknowledgement to those re-elected to new positions.

Progress of the current fundraising drive was discussed. If you haven't sent in your contribution yet, don't worry—you're not too late! Ideas on how to meet the GCA's goal of \$15,000 were also considered. Monies raised by the drive are used to pay for insurance, repairs, and maintenance of the Community Center building and property as well as the GCA's expenses in hosting community events. Also discussed were a community Open House in the Fall and a couple of village meetings held on Saturday mornings so that more people might attend.

The Bosque quit claims issue is still unresolved. Morgan Gafford and his new surveyor claim to have a document that gives them the right to claim the lands in question, but no one has seen it yet. The new assessor has told the GCA it will have to take the issue into court to get it resolved. The County won't act on a quit claim until a new survey is supplied.

Get your hats and work gloves out and head on over to the Community Center on SATURDAY APRIL 30th at 9AM for this year's COMMUNITY CLEAN UP DAY! Enjoy coffee and donuts with friends and neighbors, receive your trash bag, choose a cleanup route, and off you go. Bags can be left by the roadside for later pick up. DRIVING IN THE BOSQUE

On Easter Sunday, a four-wheel-drive vehicle got very stuck in the Bosque mud south of the old bridge, well downstream of the point beyond which motorized vehicles are permitted under the terms of the easement between the GCA and owner Richard Griscom, under a March 2003 District Court judgment.

The Community Association holds the easement, signed in February 2002, for the benefit of the public. Under the easement's terms, motorized vehicles entering the Bosque at the old bridge may drive no further downstream than the roundabout just east of where the horseback trail crosses the creek. Beyond that point, only pedestrians, horses with riders, and bicyclists are permitted. The rocks and signs that previously marked the easement have been removed by unauthorized individuals.

The process of extricating the vehicle left giant ruts in the mud deposited by recent flooding, as well as many smaller ruts within and outside the easement. A number of us have been working with Earth Works Institute and its Galisteo Watershed Restoration Project to reduce erosion along the creek. Incidents like this undermine these efforts by killing the vegetation that helps prevent erosion.

The easement was agreed to by the community, so please respect its terms. A healthier ecology along the creek will benefit not only current Galisteo residents, but future generations as well. Thank you. -- Tom Morin, President, Galisteo Community Association, and Richard Griscom
