### **"HOPE IS THE THING WITH FEATHERS"** Jan Saunders

Birds are the only animals in the world that have feathers. Feathers give birds flight and warmth. We identify birds by the color of their feathers that form light and dark patterns. Many birds are named for the color patterns of their feathers: the Red-Winged Blackbird, the Yellow-Rumped Warbler, the Ferruginous Hawk, and the Blue Grosbeak. We birders like the colorful feathers because they offer an aid to identification. Birds are surely fond of their feathers because they provide protective coloration. Colorful ornamental feathers on male birds seem to serve to attract the opposite sex. The bright colors of the male bird advertise that he is healthy and will make a good mate.

Feathers are not only unique, they are highly specialized and form follows function. Down feathers are soft airy insulators. Contour feathers smooth out body angles and give birds an aerodynamic shape. The wing of a bird is a marvel of feather function. The contour feathers on the front of the wing coverts together with the larger, longer, and thinner flight feathers create a thicker leading edge and a thicker trailing edge which form an airfoil that provides lift as the wing moves through the air.

It takes a lot of feathers to make a bird. In 1882, Ernest Thompson Seton counted 4,915 feathers on a Brewer's Blackbird. A single feather is made up of a central rachis, or quill shaft, with a series of barbed and unbarbed laterals extending from it. These laterals overlap and hook onto one another to form a rigid feather. When a bird preens his feathers with his bill he is re-engaging the barbs to "zip up" each feather for warmth and more efficient flight.

Using "feather muscles" birds can raise, lower, and rearrange their feathers. By raising or fluffing their feathers, birds appear larger and feel warmer. Hummingbirds can adjust every single

feather on their body to flash their prismatic colors to signal aggression or flirt with the opposite sex.

Emily Dickinson wrote:

Hope is the thing with feathers That perches in the soul, And sings the tune -- without the words. And never stops at all.

And sweetest in the gale is heard; And sore must be the storm That could abash the little bird That kept so many warm.

I've heard it in the chillest land, And on the strangest sea; Yet, never, in extremity, It asked a crumb of me.

## **GCA REPORT** Linda Braun, Secretary

At the September 19th Board meeting, Linda Rice came to the Open Forum to discuss use of the Community Center as a temporary residence for hurricane evacuees. The board has gotten approval for this from our insurance company. We discussed the idea of the GCA hosting a fundraiser for hurricane victims, possibly a Halloween Party with some items to be auctioned. A group will meet to further discuss this.

Residents filed their responses to the Morgan Gafford Quiet Claim in court last week. The GCA is included. It is our intention to keep the Bosque open for everyone in the community. Morgan has brought a second suit against Chris Griscom for land that she owns, and has also contacted some of the original people a second time with additional claims. The next step is disclosure, having Morgan indicate why he's doing this and what his intentions are. The GCA is considering setting up some kind of a special defense fund to assist the community in fighting Morgan's claims, but will wait for more information before we move on this.

Another topic discussed was the enhancement and improvement of the park/playground at the Community Center. We would like it to be a fun and comfortable place for kids, teens, and adults to enjoy. Some of the amenities we'd like to see there: tetherball, trees and irrigation system, picnic tables, drinking fountain, climbing structure, sandbox, tennis backboard/ handball court, and seesaw. Two architects are being contacted about assisting with the design. If you or your kids have any suggestions please do so right away. Just call a board member and let us know what your idea is.

The Board is ready to improve the community bulletin board so that papers posted there won't get torn down or blown away.

We discussed the possibility of having the Mobile Health Fair Van, which provides free health assessments, education and assistance in finding affordable healthcare, come to Galisteo. This opportunity will be announced after church services. If there's enough interest a date will be set up for them to come.

Board member Nick Merrick submitted his need to resign from the board, as his travel schedule doesn't allow him to be at meetings. Alternate Beth Foote will now be a full Board member.

# **PEDACITOS/BITS AND PIECES**

A collaborative piece Jean made with Matt Duran won the Alan and Ann Vedder Award for "proficiency in traditional materials"; that same piece won the Grand Prize at the Hispanic Arts Gallery at Expo New Mexico, plus another award there.

John Massee is showing his "Bottle Cart, complete with Indulgences, Absolutionary Functions, Dispensary Devices and Expunging Capabilities" at Sculpture 619, 619 Canvon Rd.

Judy Tuwaletstiwa had a solo show at Linda Durham's Santa Fe Gallery in August in which she painstakingly took apart and rearranged feathers, a moth, a nest. In an article on the exhibition in Pasatiempo (Aug.12), she cited the desert landscape, memories, and the unconscious as her sources: "I hope that, standing before my paintings, a viewer becomes more mindful of this fragile moment we call life."

Saddleback Ranch is for sale for \$14.5 million. If it is broken up for subdivision, it will greatly affect village life.

The Flea Market on Sept. 24th was not a great success despite broader advertising than usual. Few people sold and few came to buy.

Priscilla Hoback writes that like many of us, she has been searching for a faster internet connection. Vicki Snyder provided her with a number at Qwest that proved helpful: Danny at 888-887-0176. "With his help," she writes, "I have signed up for ISDN." It's now up and running. "Hope this helps."

Realtor Viola Bybee was interviewed in the October Santa Fe Real Estate Guide. Her maiden name was Chavez: "My family settled in Galisteo from Spain many hundreds of years ago," she said. "I remember my great grandmother, when I was really small, still wearing high-button shoes. My great uncle, Alejandro, was the last brother of my father's father and he would come by and tell stories about sheepherding. He'd say that when the folks came from Spain they had money; they had gold bars they buried in their cellars, but through bad times they lost everything. As a young adult I tried to buy the last house in Galisteo that belonged to the Chavezes."

A 108-acre basalt rock mine proposed for the Waldo Canyon road between Cerrillos and I-25 is being opposed by area residents and the Rural Conservation Alliance. There is already a gravel mine in the area and there is not enough water to work the mine and control the dust that would be generated. The site provides the backdrop for the Cerrillos Hills Park and is historically significant. The mine's case has been tabled several times by the County Development Review Committee but will be heard again, possibly on October 20th. (Cont.p.3)

Former Galisteñas Melanie Monsour and Nacha Mendez took top honors in the musical category for the Santa Fe Municipal Court at the Historical/Hysterical Parade during Fiesta. Their song was about a homocidal drunken driver; the court's float was in memory of the woman bike rider murdered by a drunk driver in July.

The preferred route of the new commuter rail line-the RailRunner Express-was announced in August, pending agreement from local governing boards. It would cut across County roads 55 and 45 and Bonanza Creek Ranch, requiring easements through much private property and open country, as well as archaeological and environmental surveys. Tracks would turn north at Lamy and go through Eldorado to Santa Fe. A recent opinion piece by Annette Morreale in the New Mexican called the plan "a developer's dream...certain to bring a network of roads leading to residential and commercial building opportunities and more depots - and change a semi-rural area into another metropolitan area."

## **ROAD REBELLION**

Excerpts from John Benjamin's reply of August 28th to James Lujan, County Public Works Director, regarding the unofficial resurfacing of Via La Puente and La Vega, a collaboration among neighbors to counteract the suffocating dust on those roads:

"I believe that the complaints of washboard [conditions] are exaggerated and in reality I find it curious that you seem more concerned for the smooth ride of speeders than of the ability to breathe clean air of the few of us who live along Via La Puente.

"Since my research in 2000 and 2001, much more has been learned about the harm caused by airborne particles less than 2.5 microns in size. It is now proven without a doubt that these PM2.5 particles are a serious and compounding health problem. Once taken into the lungs, they stay there. They are too small to expel....

"Starting in 1987, I have used my Bobcat and a shovel to keep drainages open and keep the road surface smooth. In fact, before 1993, we never saw a County road grader in Galisteo. In 1987, the roadway now called Via La Puente was 80 feet wide. Using my Bobcat, I defined the road in its present location by placing large rocks and planting the cottonwood trees to define the north side of the road and about this time Priscilla Hoback built her portal, which defined the south side ....

"For 6 years during the late 1990s due to changes made to the drainage from La Vega by County grader operators, I had to go out in the rain during downpours to dig out inadequate drains on the roads so that my house (designated by the State as the oldest house in Galisteo, c. 1790) would not flood. The water stopped only an inch from my doorway.

"You were the fourth Public Works head whom I had spoken to about the drainage. And to your credit you put crews to installing a culvert. (Actually it was two culverts because the first was installed sloping the wrong way.) Through the years I put in at least ten hours per year working on the roads around my house. I had no idea I was violating the law. My motivation

was solely to make the quality of life in Galisteo better and to save the County road crews (which are obviously overworked and underfunded) the trouble of responding to minor washboard, potholes or drainage problems. ....I am proud that I am often the only one to appreciate the seriousness of a situation and often the first or only one to act to solve a problem....At least 20 residents have proclaimed the recent decrease in choking dust as an excellent development. Again, I apologize if my actions have usurped your authority or harmed others."


