

TACHO SANDOVAL, 1934-2012

Anastacio (Tacho) Sandoval was born in Galisteo April 16, 1934 to Frank and Lucia Sandoval, one of thirteen siblings. For 52 years he was husband to Libby Sandoval. He was father to Teresa (and husband Sam) and Frank (and wife Sadie), grandfather to Frank Jr. and Joseph, Monica, Samantha, Samone and Juan, great-grandfather to Analicia, Estevan and Juliet. He was uncle and godfather to many and friend to all.

In his 78 years, Tacho, like many of our elders, had a quite a life. He was a sheepherder in Galisteo, an Army veteran, stationed in Fort Bliss, Texas, in 1957. He was a grounds caretaker at the College of Santa Fe and worked in the cornfields irrigating for Governor Bruce King. He retired as caretaker for the King Estate. He was a member of the St. Anthony and St. Joseph Societies here in Galisteo.

Tacho was an extra in the movie *Young Guns*. He was also a musician who played beautifully on the accordion, and sometimes harmonica. He would play with my Dad Onesimo, Luis Chavez, Benjie Mares, and Orlando Sanchez from Lamy. He would also convince Marie Sandoval to play the accordion. Teresa and Frank remember when they would all go over to Manuel and Clarita Anaya's and then to Mela's or Mary Alice's to sing *Las Mañanitas* for New Years Eve.

When the children were little, the family would stop at Landon's Store in Stanley to pick up snacks, then visit with friends and family. He loved to go hunting with his brothers Fidel, Joe and George, and later with his son, Frank. He could fix just about anything people would ask him to, and now Frank does the same, as well as the grandsons.

Tacho especially loved joking with his grandchildren and great grandchildren. Family was very important to him and Libby. They were also very social, going to the Senior Centers in Santa Fe and always showing up at the GCA's Saturday Coffees.

I knew it was officially summer when Freddie and I would sit and listen outside our home at the top of the hill to Tacho playing with my Dad and Mom, or over across the bridge with Luis and Remedios, or at Tacho and Libby's house. The music and children's laughter could be heard throughout the village. Sometimes I still go out, thinking I can still hear them.


A GERMAN PAINTER IN GALISTEO

In 1937, painter Heinz Emil Salloch (1908-1985) was teaching art to Jewish children in Berlin and refused to use the Nazi newspaper in class. He was forced to flee persecution, going first to Cuba, and then to the U.S. Known in America as Henry, in the 1950s (according to Michael Abatemarco in *Pasatiempo*, 11/12), "he turned his attention to the landscapes and distinctive Pueblo style architecture of the Southwest," including New



Mexico villages like Cundiyo, Cerrillos and Galisteo. An exhibition at the A Gallery in Santa Fe recently showed his watercolors and pastels. Salloch's son Roger lives in Santa Fe and writes for THE Magazine.

GALISTEO VOLUNTEER FIRE & RESCUE

In January, when the fire department sends out the Galisteo phone directory, you will find enclosed new forms for pre-incident emergency planning ("pre-plans"). The GVFR's current files are aging and out of date. New houses have been built; old ones have been added onto; owners have sold, moved away, separated, or died, and new people have moved to the village.

Pre-plan files help the fire department anticipate what may be encountered at an emergency, especially at night when visibility is poor. Although no one is required to submit the requested information, it can improve our services to the community and benefit everyone. These files are treated with confidentiality and are used only to help emergency responses be as efficient and timely as possible.

At the request of several people in the village who live alone, following a recent incident here, the new pre-incident form will ask that the emergency contact name be someone who is next of kin or who has power of attorney. While this is not strictly necessary for minor incidents, it is critically important if one lives alone and becomes unresponsive due to a severe injury or illness. The fire department is likely to be the first responder to a medical emergency and may be the only early resource for contact information. Because of federal privacy regulations restricting who can know about a victim's injuries or illnesses, only someone who is next of kin or has the power of attorney can talk to hospital personnel and find out what happened and take control of the patient's welfare.

The pre-incident forms will request information about building construction, location of propane tanks and electrical circuit breaker boxes, exterior hazards that can trip or entangle a firefighter and any water sources on the property, as well as a sketch of the buildings and any special conditions in approaching them. Please do your best to give your fire department the requested information. It could be a life-saver.

SOLAR SYSTEMS #6:YOUR EDITOR

When I built my little "shack by the creek" in 1992-93, it turned out to be terribly expensive to get electricity to it. (I was then the only one between the highway and the Griscoms on the west side of Avenida Vieja.) At first I plugged the house into my car battery. A little dayglo plug hung out from under the hood and hooked up to a socket in the wall. "Is this legal?" I asked. "Oh yes, in New Mexico, it's a badge of honor. It means you're rural!" But I had to use the car every day; it wasn't the solution.

My builders were from Madrid and lived off the grid, and they recommended solar. A then-boyfriend knew how to hook up a couple of solar panels, leaning against the side of the house, to golf cart batteries in the living room. When the inspector came the panels were hidden in the arroyo. "Why?" I asked. "I thought it was legal?" "Well, just to be on the safe side..."

To make a long story short, I eventually got a solar tracker and a slightly less hokey system (though I had to crawl under my desk and breathe fumes to top up the battery water.) Finally, Positive Energy entered the picture. With them I got rid of my nasty gas ice box, and had more panels installed on the roof. It's all much more efficient, but it's also more sophisticated, i.e. computerized; I'm not always up to the maintenance. Allan Sindelar, founder of Positive Energy, has been incredibly patient about my occasional ineptitude. And I love having lights when the rest of the PNM-reliant village goes dark!
