MARK EDWARD BENIGNO (1960-2016)

Mark passed away suddenly of a heart attack on Sept.26th at the age of 56. He was born in New Orleans and raised in Houston and Dallas. Having played baseball in high school, he continued his excellent pitching at Texas A&M. After graduation he opened a successful marketing company in Dallas. Years later he moved to Galisteo and worked on nearby ranches. When in the village, he started every day with cups of coffee with neighbors and was always ready to help anyone with any project any time. He appreciated a shot of Bourbon, a Cuban cigar, and a good laugh.

Mark gave of himself tirelessly to make others' lives better. He delivered meals for Seniors in the Galisteo and El Dorado area. He and Sherry divided their time between Galisteo and Pennsylvania and traveled extensively. He loved adventure and created memorable moments whereever he found himself. On frequent travels to Guatemala, he took hungry children out to eat, bought clothes and school supplies for the needy.

Mark is mourned by his beloved partner Sherry Kerstetter and his many friends here. At a memorial at Priscilla Hoback's on Oct. 23rd, his humor and generosity was recalled and his friends made it clear they felt lucky to have known him. Mark is survived by Sherry, his mother, five brothers and sisters, and nieces and nephews. (Thanks to Sherry Kerstetter.)


STUDIO TOUR

PEDACITOS/BITS AND PIECES

The New Mexican endorsed Democrat Matthew McQueen for State Representative, District 50, citing his "concern for and understanding of environmental issues....reducing poverty, developing better jobs, and providing better alcohol and drug treatment." He "supports raising the minimum wage and is against simplistic solutions to deal with violent crime. He is a thoughtful and nuanced thinker, something politics and governing needs." (HE WON!).

Interesting fact: The **Galisteo Volunteer Fire and Rescue** receives far fewer donations from residents of Ranchitos than from the village proper, although the GVFR works equally hard on the whole area.

Shaun Gilmore's mixed media collages and strange twisty sculptures are featured in the current (and prestigious) Alcove Show at the New Mexico Museum of Art, closing December 5th.

A full page ad for **Scott Diffrient's** stunning green jewelry, at Malouf on the Plaza, appeared in magazines this August.

UPDATES

From Roger Taylor

Following the County approval of the Galisteo Community Plan & Zoning in 2012, the Planning Committee (Roger Taylor, Anna Cardenas, Leslie Dilworth, Michael Golino, Frank Hirsch, Lucy Lippard) began working with the NM Frontiers Program to develop plans for limited growth and revitalization in Galisteo along NM 41 -- to respond to the loss of businesses since the financial crash of 2008. When a draft plan was submitted, we were considered to have successfully completed the Frontiers program -- the first community in the County to do so!

The County decided to sponsor this effort, and contributed \$20K to hire consultants to assist us with the **Galisteo Village**

Center Revitalization Action Plan. The revised plan will be presented at the Nov. 12th breakfast meeting (see p. 1). The community will 1) review the prior planning efforts in Galisteo; 2) gather ideas and input on the village center; and 3) amend and prioritize Revitalization Actions to launch implementation.

Santa Fe County held a public informational meeting at the Community Center on October 20th to discuss the **Thornton Ranch Open Space Master Plan.** A draft master plan of 4-5 proposed public access trails totaling c. 7 miles, with parking areas and historical display panels, situated on 2,440-acres of County-owned land across the railroad tracks to the south of County Rd 42. The presentation attracted a large audience of area residents, hikers, equestrians, and bicyclists.

The county has made this a high priority project, and funds are to be provided through the Open Space/Trails Bond issue on the November ballot. Once funding has been approved, before the trails will be open to the public, it will take about four years of additional planning, construction, and sign-offs from various County, State and Federal Departments, as well as from eight to ten Pueblos whose ancestors lived in the Galisteo Basin.

La Sala made great strides to completion this year. The interior walls were covered with off-white American Clay, and the bancos and trim boards were painted with a gray-green popular in the late 1800's (thanks to the Netflix film production crew.) A grant paid for materials & equipment for the 2-coat final mud plastering on all the exterior walls, and community volunteers, interns and a crew from Castleton University in Vermont provided the labor. A second grant helped pay for two of the most damaged windows to be repaired, sealed and painted (thanks to volunteers Ed Epping and Charlie Holloway). The Board and Gallery Committee did a remarkable job opening the gallery this year to successful sales, a busy Studio Tour artists preview and info center, and the recent Salsa dance. More to come in 2017!

On Saturday, July 9th, the GCA hosted a Saturday Coffee & Breakfast in the bosque. After delicious offerings from Cafe Fina kicked in, groups formed to do follow-up maintenance work from the bosque restoration in March/April this year. Blockages in the stream bed were removed and dead willows were piled higher up on the embankments. (BTW, dried willow wood makes excellent kindling - burns hot! Anyone is welcome to haul some away.) Russian Olive shoots were pruned and bagged and a citric acid solution was applied to the stumps. Alas, it didn't help. This fall hundreds of stubborn shoots are flourishing again. More work to do.
