WATER SYSTEM MODERNIZED

On December 3rd, the Galisteo Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association (GMDWCA) replaced the old manually-read water meters with new radioread meters -- tiny radio transmitters that send encoded information to a special receiver, which then records the current water use. This procedure is faster, less labor intensive, and is not affected by weather. (No more looking for meters buried in snow.) Our new Certified Operator, Rudy Martinez, can read the meters from his vehicle while driving past, since the information is legible within several yards.

The GMDWCA has implemented this change in order to read our meters more often (every month now) and more accurately. Why more often? Because these meters can also detect leaks, which means we can help our members be more efficient with their water use, and be warned of intermittent leaks (like toilets running) so they can be fixed sooner.


Starting in March of 2017, we will implement a new tiered pricing system. The new rate structure was included in members' February water bill. The Board will be happy to answer any questions.

RETURN OF THE D.O.T. Roger Taylor

As the Galisteo liaison with the County and State, I have been notified that NMDOT plans to begin road construction on Highway 41 in mid-to-late July 2017, continuing through late Fall of 2018. They will release a Request for Bids to contractors later this month. I met with the Project Manager for a three-hour deep dive, and can confirm that the plan will follow the agreement reached with our community almost five years ago. Here are the key components:

Re-construction of NM41 will start from the far side of the bridge over the San Cristobal Arroyo, this side of the Rodeo grounds, and extend 9-10 miles to the top of Clark Hill.

The high points of hilltop rises will be "sectioned," meaning that they will be lowered by several feet. The fill removed will be used to increase the heights of the dips in the road. The road will not be a flat highway (one of the original proposals we opposed years ago); it will still be a rolling road, just with less (Cont. p.2) (Below: The Long View: Bill Huckaby's calavera chair on the prairie)

DOT: highs and lows. The **lanes will remain 12-feet wide**, but **6-foot shoulders** will be added on either side.

Several sections of roadway will be under reconstruction at any one time with **one-lane access**, and each section will have signalized traffic stops; in some areas there may be traffic lead cars.

For the duration of construction, **"Closed to Truck Traffic" signs** will be posted at the intersections of NM41/I-285, NM41/I-40, County Roads 14/42. When re-construction is complete, the current posted speed limit of 55 MPH will remain the same.

At my request they will direct the winning contractor(s) to **bring equipment, asphalt, etc. from Moriarty** and restrict use of CR 42 and NM41 for this purpose. During the timeline of this project, the Project Manager will remain in contact with me to notify us of any changes, and I will be the contact with him about any issues that may arise in the village. I will also keep Representative Matthew McQueen and Senator Liz Stefanics informed. Our County Commissioner Robert Anaya is apparently already in the loop.

MEMORIES Stella Maestas

Some people spend a lifetime searching for treasures. They don't realize that the memories stored in their minds are treasures. I feel that each day we take away a memory from our existence in this world. I àm very fortunate to have been blessed with a family that shared a mutual love, kindness, and respect.

Growing up in a household of fourteen, we learned to live within our means, and considered ourselves lucky to have the necessities provided for us by our parents. Sometimes I wonder if I thanked them enough for their efforts. I'm positive they are both still watching over us.

My early years in school were spent in a classroom that was heated with coal. The heater stood in the center of a large room with wood floors, and very oldfashioned desks. I remember taking lunch to school on days that were so cold that my parents did not want us to be walking home. Our lunches consisted of a mason jar of oatmeal with milk and sugar. I still remember how good that tasted. Or my mother would fry eggs with potatoes, and make us sandwiches on homemade tortillas. Some of the other children made fun of us because we didn't have a sandwich on bread with lunch meat in it. When my older son was in school, his classmates wanted to trade him for his homemade breakfast burrito.Now, burritos are a way of life.

Wow, how times have changed. Life was so simple then, and we were content. Today, there is so much, and yet we take it for granted. As children, when the holidays approached at school, we sang all sorts of festive holiday songs. One in particular made an impression on me -- "Over the River and through the Woods." Now I don't know exactly why, but songs that talked about turkey and all the fixings made me wonder what having these foods at our table would be like. We never had a turkey until much later in my life. Today it seems to rain turkeys from the sky. Now here is another way in which we are truly blessed these days. Oh, we had plenty of food for the holidays, just not these traditional foods. Fortunately my brothers were great deer hunters (during deer hunting season, of course), so we always had venison.

My fondest memories of those days were when my grandfather Epifano Mora came to visit with us on Christmas Eve, when everyone gathered for *Los Pastores*. He brought us Christmas candy, peanuts, and walnuts. It was wonderful to have him come to spend the holidays with us. The younger children in our family were very early to rise on Christmas morning. Like all the other children, we would go out to friends' and neighbors' homes to ask for Christmas candy. Our flour sacks would get generously filled with goodies. (I ate only small amounts of mine so it would last longer.) This was another one of the traditions in our culture, kind of like "trick or treat."

Those were only some of the days that I hold dear to my heart, and these are only a few bits and pieces of my treasured memories. Hopefully I have shared my philosophy with you. I know that God has blessed me abundantly with my family, and all that I need to be comfortable. Until next time, I leave you with these words: "We have all been given a gift, let us grasp it, and be grateful."

25 YEARS OF THE GVFR

Mark your calendars! Galisteo's beloved (and beleaguered) Fire Department will celebrate its 25th year with a breakfast at the Station on April 29th. Bids will soon go out for the construction of the new truck bay (hopefully to be completed by August), and the whole building will be reroofed and re-stuccoed. Because the village is so small (and careful?) Galisteo has the lowest number of calls in the County, just below Stanley, which does not mean that it is any less necessary for our safety and those of other towns where the GVFR often performs mutual aid. The County's almost 8,000 annual calls (including false alarms) are primarily medical emergencies, with only 452 fires last year.

LOCAL DEMOCRATS HOLD ELECTIONS

On February 20th, registered Democrats from Ward 3D gathered at the Galisteo Community Center to elect a Chair, Vice Chair and Delegates to the Santa Fe County convention. Ward 3D includes Cerrillos, Golden, Madrid, Galisteo, and parts of *(Cont. p. 4)* Lamy. **Estelle Berger** and **Roger Taylor** of Galisteo were elected as Ward Chair and Vice Chair. 
