STORMY WEATHER


A "tornadic" thunderstorm event hit the Galisteo area on October 4th, bringing flooding and destruction in its path. Roger Taylor measured 6" of rain in 20 minutes when it was at full force. Judy Tuwaletstiwa reports there was a "strange fierce wind from the west, driving golf-ball sized hail around 6:30 PM." Power went out around 7:00 and residents gathered at El Puente to watch the creek rise over 6' high and 60' wide. PNM worked all night to make a temporary line to restore power on the east side. The bridge was closed to traffic, and so were portions of CR 42. A chunk of the creek's east bank collapsed. Vultures were staggering around on the ground until their rain-heavy wings dried enough to fly again. Galisteans suffered hail damage to vehicles and many broken skylights.

Downstream, the reporting gauge c. 5 miles north west of Cerrillos peaked around 5AM but water levels to the Galisteo Dam didn't subside until mid-morning. Of course it couldn't have anything to do with climate change...

IMPORTANT NOTICES FROM GVFR

1. RED ALERT BAG: Please contact Ed Epping (eepping@ williams.edu) to obtain your Red Bag emergency information sheet and Red Cross magnet. Complete **one** Medication List + Emergency Contact Information form for each person in your household; place them in separate **Red Alert Bags** with their name on the bag and then place the bags in your refrigerator freezer. Stick the Red Cross magnet on front of the freezer door so that the GVFR knows the sheets are there.

2. SMART 911 SAFETY PROFILE: This profile is free, private and secure. Put as much or as little information in it as you like. It's up to you, and your information will only be seen if you ever have to call 911. You can add key information about members of your household (including pets) that would help them in the event of an emergency, whether the call is from the home or a mobile phone.

3. WILDLAND FIRE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM: Wildland fires are an increasing risk. This program can help you help the community reduce that threat. If you would also like a personal assessment, three members of the GVFR have been trained to help you identify what can be done to make your home and your neighbors better prepared. Advising us to "put down the craft beer and try a hard cider at one of these chill taprooms," an on-line feature (Sept. 28) headlined "Five Cider Taprooms to Try This Fall," selected from across the nation, included **Craig Moya's New Mexico Hard Cider** in Santa Fe: "This desert dive features a long bar, plenty of two-tops, and taps of hard cider made from apples sourced in-state and brewed locally. Cider flavors cover the fruity rainbow: strawberry, blueberry, mango, raspberry, cranberry, and apricot. Its flagship cider, the Doña Tules Semi Sweet, is lightly carbonated with a crisp, clean finish. The most exotic cider flavor here has to be the Purple Bunny, an earthy mixture of sweetened apple cider and purple carrot wine. Tacos, quesadillas, and (yes!) Frito Pie round out the Southwestern-inspired food menu."

Greg O'Byrne enjoyed his annual moment of fame as Executive Director of the always successful Wine & Chile Fiesta. He was quoted in *The New Mexican*'s feature (Sept 23) that "people like what's new and interesting," and they often choose authenticity over price.

The Land Water People Time annual magazine suggested a "Southern Loop" for tourists including "the village of Galisteo, a quaint rural community with numerous adobe structures and home to a diverse population, including noted artists, writers, and healing practitioners. Stop by the newly renovated Galisteo Art Center and the beautiful church Iglesia Nuestra Senora de Remedios [sic] built in 1884."

CHILE/MARGARITA COOKOFF





WATER BOARD'S DILEMMA

The Board of the Galisteo Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association is struggling with the contradictions between unavoidable State legal regulations and being responsible and compassionate members of a small community. We are bound by law to collect payments, and several villagers are in arrears.

As unpaid bills stack up, members have several options: Come and talk to the Board about your concerns at the next meeting; pay in full; send one half the owed amount with a letter to the Board; initiate a hardship claim by contacting any Board member. (The Board will respect your privacy but will need some proof of your financial situation.) The monthly \$22 membership fee (plus tax) is due even if your service is shut down and we have to charge \$25 to turn it back on. A meaningful community dialogue around these issues will benefit us all.
