PEDACITOS/BITS AND PIECES

Jean Anaya Moya is showing work in the exhibition, "The Art of Adam & Eve" at the National Hispanic Cultural Center Art Museum (1701 4th St. SW in Albuquerque, Tues-Sun.10-5). This is a good time to get to the NHCC because it is also presenting "Que Chola: Celebrating Strength, Power, and Resilience."

On June 7th, **Judy Tuwaletstiwa**'s major show "The Dream Life of Objects," opened at the Center for Contemporary Arts. A violin performance and discussion (July 14) and a panel (August 30) are scheduled around the show, which is up until Sept. 15th.

Patrick McFarlin's *Downtown Club Revival* at SITE Santa Fe was featured in *The New Mexican* (June 8) and doubled as an 80th birthday celebration. His solo exhibition of oil paintings in monotypes at Webster Collection (541/2 Lincoln Ave, above the Plaza Café) continues until July 8.

Conservation Voters of New Mexico's 2019 environmental score card just came out, and our **Rep Matthew McQueen** got a grade of 100%, up from his lifetime score of 96%.

Sina Brush wrote a letter to *The New Mexican* (5/20/19) questioning the wisdom of adding more Margarita drinking (and driving) on the Margarita Trail in Santa Fe.

Two articles by **Deborah Madison** appeared in *Heritage* magazine (Winter/Spring 2019) on "Chimayo's Chile Culture" and Estevan Restaurante in Santa Fe.

"Living Down Country People: **Names of the Galisteo Basin**" by Roberto H. Valdez was published in the recent issue of *Land Water People*, which also included an article on Lone Piñon, the lively conjunto band that played at La Sala last month.

Lucy Lippard has curated a show ("Alicia Stewart: Unfinished....") at the Harwood Museum in Taos of the remarkable paintings of a young Santa Fe artist who died at the age of eighteen. It's up until Nov. 10. (And this is a good time to go to the Harwood; the featured exhibition is Judy Chicago's *Birth Project* from New Mexico collections and there is a small show of beautiful *colchas* and amazing mega-drawings by Afton Love.)

The June issue of *The Magazine* includes a painting of **Agnes Martin**'s former Galisteo home by Eleanor Ray and a discussion of **Harmony Hammond**'s older work in Shane Tolbert's "West by Southwest: Considering Landscape in Contemporary Art," and a New Mexico Women feature on your editor. **Hammond**'s paintings are at Art Basel in Switzerland, described as an integral part of the narrative of modernist abstraction, even as they insist on an oppositional discourse of feminist and queer content. Layering patches of fabric over

grommets, Hammond evokes a bandaged body, implying "an interruption of the narrative of the modernist grid and therefore, an interruption of utopian egalitarian order."

Former Galistean film photographer **Bill ("Billie") Mitchell** had one of the most popular pieces in the new media exhibition *Currents*, at El Museo Cultural. *Bike Party* was a Virtual Reality experience with stationary bikes, and take it from your editor, it was exciting biking in a herd of other riders in DC, Baltimore and DC. On opening night, outside on the railyard, Bill's *Mobile Projection Platform - MPP* projected thrilling driving shots on window screens.

For all those who have suffered the bumps and grinds of **NM 41** south of the village after its \$20 million plus so-called "improvements," construction has had to recommence because, according to NMDOT, soil testing was inaccurate. Another \$4.2 million is being spent to fix the brand-new work.

And speaking of roads, a feature in *The Reporter* (6/13) and a cover story in *The New Mexican* headlined "The Fix Is In?" (6/13) reported that over the last few years, the County spent almost \$1 million in improvements for the remote B Anaya Road off NM41 in Stanley, "and crews are out there again, paving away." Named for Basilio Anaya, grandfather of Galisteo's former County Commissioners **Mike and Robert Anaya**, it leads to their ranch and dead ends at the home of Robert Martinez, the County's Deputy Public Works Director.

The New Mexican (6/8) reported that **Saddleback Ranch**, north of the village on NM41, was sold in 2008 for \$17.45 million, one of the highest priced local properties in this century.

Former Galistean **Richard Shuff** recently reminded us that he has more than 10,000 digital photos of Galisteo. He photographed "just about every person in Galisteo and many varied subjects."

This from Judy Tuwaletstiwa a couple of weeks ago: "**Rattlesnakes** are out...or *in* depending on how one looks at it." A small one, c.18" long, slid in under the screen door into her kitchen. "Once we got it in a box, Jim Sloan came down to pick it up." Question: Do baby rattlers pack a bigger venom wallop because they don't yet know how to control it, or is that a myth?

And this on another potential pest from **Susie Shanklin: Nolo Bait** is an EPA-registered biological control for grasshoppers. It contains naturally occurring Nosema locustae spores, uniformly applied to flaky wheat bran. Grasshoppers eating it are infected with the spores. Young ones die more quickly than older ones. Infected grasshoppers are cannibalized by healthy ones and Nosema Locust spreads though the population. This organism provides long-term benefits to landowners without environmental damage.

On May 21, **Angie Beauchamp** won election to the University of New Mexico Staff Council Executive Committee, and will serve as Treasurer. This eight-person board leads the Staff Council, elected representatives of the more than 7000 UNM staff, to advocate with the university administration and Board of Regents. (Her campaign speech included mention of her work as Treasurer of La Sala de Galisteo.) Angie is the administrator and a lecturer in Film and Digital Arts Dept. and was elected last year to the Staff Council to represent the College of Fine Arts.


GVFR NEWS:

Plain and simple, I am fascinated by and attracted to SNAKES. I want to read about them, see them, and observe all species, venomous and non-venomous. Don't get me wrong, I respect them and prefer to keep my distance while learning their natural history. I also understand that you, the reader, might be phobic or have an aversion to scaly critters that possess venom and fangs like hypodermic needles. A bite from one of our local rattlers, serious and painful, is to be avoided at all costs.

On the other hand, a snake that comes in contact with a human usually ends up dead, and that bothers me because all snakes occupy an important niche in healthy ecosystems while at the same time providing *pro bono* rodent control. And since recent fossil discoveries indicate that snakes have slithered our earth for more than 150 million years, just maybe we should admit to their right to slither on for a long time to come. After several months wrestling with just the right tone and tack to take in writing about snakes, I happily shelved my efforts to make room for the following Best Snake Story Ever:

As has been their habit for many years, Dianne and Vernon Wilson dropped their Toyota truck off to Michael, their favorite mechanic, to have the shocks replaced. When they returned to reclaim the truck, Michael greeted them with a big smile and the words "Your truck has a tenant." He then presented them with a large plastic, lidded bucket containing a rather beautiful Bull Snake, adding that their job was to return the snake to Galisteo where it clearly wanted to be. So, Dianne and Vernon put the bucket in the Toyota and returned to Galisteo where they released, quite near their house, all four feet of snake.

According to Michael the Mechanic, while underneath the Toyota working overhead to replace the shocks, he realized he was staring up into two round beady snake eyes. He didn't panic since he knew a thing or two about snakes, most importantly that venomous Rattle Snakes have cat eyes (vertical pupils), and therefore he must have been nose to nose with a harmless nonvenomous Bull Snake. Michael carefully removed it from the wheel well (as his crew "freaked out" at the sight of the harmless snake), and carried it quite a distance away to a vacant lot filled with weeds, rock and rubble—a perfect spot for a constrictor that preys on rats and mice.

Once freed from his armload, Michael returned to the Toyota to pick up where he left off. Glancing up a short time later, Michael was surprised to see the Bull Snake slithering straight for him and the Toyota. He stopped work, gathered up the now all-too-familiar Bull Snake, and once again walked "way far away" from the Toyota -- twice as far as before—until he felt certain it was safely ensconced in a perfect Bull Snake habitat, never to return. He walked back to the Toyota, closing the garage bay door behind him.

Well, the old adage "*Never say never*," fits nicely into this story because (and I promise I am not making this up), when Michael finished the maintenance and raised the bay door, that Bull Snake was waiting right outside.

Clearly this cannot be the end of the story since the burning, unanswered question remains: *Why did the Bull snake repeatedly return to the Toyota and what was it doing in the wheel well in the first place*?

Friends and family offer the explanation that the Bull Snake must have eggs back in Galisteo, although for any snake to "think" that returning to the Toyota was the way back to Galisteo and its eggs is asking a wee bit too much of a tiny reptilian brain. Additional research reveals that Bull Snakes don't lay eggs until June or July, but they do inhabit a small territory to which they are faithful. Could it be that the Toyota is this Bull Snake's territory?
