A TRAGIC WEEK IN JANUARY

On the morning of January 14, Pedro Allan Sandoval (2003-2020) and his brother Mateo Francisco Sandoval (2005-2020) died in an automobile accident on NM 41 between Stanley and Moriarty. They are Stella Maestas's great nephews and related to many others in Galisteo.

Both brothers were on the Moriarty High School football, basketball and track teams, members of 4H, the Sociedad de San José, and the National Junior Honor Society, and had won many sports and academic honors. They loved the outdoors, gaming, and working with kids. They are survived by their parents, Ernie and Alexandra (Lexi) Sandoval, and their sister Camille.

Memorial Services, attended by hundreds, were held on Jan. 22 at the Moriarty High School Gym. Banners read "#Sandoval Strong" and "60+40 = 100 percent" (for the brothers' football team numbers). Honorary pallbearers were the entire student body. The Pintos won their next game, an emotional moment. The brothers are buried at the Stanley cemetery. A GoFundMe account for the family was over \$40,000 within a few days.

Two days earlier, Galisteans Deirdre Africa and Heidi Johnson lost an only son and brother. The Joplin, Missouri newspaper reported: "Colby Tait Africa, 45, a senior programmer for Projility, passed away Sunday Jan. 12, 2020. He is survived by his son Parker Africa of Monett, MO, his mother Deirdre, and sister Heidi, both of Galisteo, NM." Deirdre adds, "With generous donations from the community, I'm planting a Liberty apple tree to remember the person he was."

PEDACITOS/BITS AND PIECES

Some Galisteans felt the 2.9 strength **earthquake** on Saturday morning, Jan. 26th. Others woke up at exactly 6:36 AM but didn't know why. Still others noticed odd reactions from their dogs. Lamy was apparently closer to the epicenter (16K south of Eldorado). One woman there felt her two-story house shake.

Peggy Diggs is showing her ongoing work on race and the construction of whiteness, based on sixty interviews, at Vital Spaces Midtown Storefront (1604 St. Michaels), opening on 2/21, 5-7, until 3/21 (Fri., Sat., noon-5). The work is largely studies for forthcoming public projects exploring whiteness as a set of trained understandings about Us and Them.

Judy Tuwaletstiwa responded enthusiastically in *The New Mexican* (2/12) to the news that Mayor Alan Webber was taking Spanish lessons in order to read the fiesta proclamation. Others were more skeptical.

Jacob Brown, 41, from Moriarty, has been convicted of charges tied to a March 2018 **road-rage incident near Galisteo** that intentionally injured a group of cyclists, Seniors on Bikes, one of them seriously. After yelling obscenities, Brown backed into the cyclists and then left the scene of the accident. He was sentenced to 3 ½ years in prison.

THE RETURN OF NETFLIX

The large number of vehicles at the Silverado movie set on Cerro Pelon Ranch is due to NetFlix filming through May 15th. Representatives met with GCA officers Roger Taylor and Anna Cárdenas to review Galisteo filming guidelines. All filming will be at the movie set; the crew will respect the night sky ordinance as well as limit sound disruption; all crew and cast will be reminded regularly about speed limits through Galisteo; heavy equipment will travel I-40 to NM41 to the set.

After current construction at the set (6:30 AM to 6:30 PM), filming will begin 3/13 to 4/20 (c.5AM to 10PM, mostly weekdays) with 100-150 actors and a crew of around 250. Traffic will increase. Expect drones and one night of simulated dynamiting and fire (hopefully avoiding the almost disastrous *Wild Wild West* fire years ago). From 4/21 to 5/15 there will be remediation on the set (6:30AM to 6:30 PM).

Please direct concerns or questions during this entire period to Roger or Anna and we will address them with the Location Managers. Silverado, of course, is private property. The set will be closed to the public.

FROM THE GCA

The Pre-Primary Delegate Election of the Ward 3D Democratic Party of Santa Fe County (DPSFC) was held at the GCC on 2/9. Twenty six voters elected two Delegates (Linda Doezma and Marcy Hintz) and one Alternate Delegate (Vernon Anaya) to the Santa Fe County Pre-Primary convention and the State Democratic Party Convention. They will join Estelle Berger (Chair, DPSFC), Roger Taylor (Vice-Chair, DPSFC) and Eric Tyson (Ward 3D) in casting votes at the conventions to determine which candidates get on the ballot in November.

At the February GCA Board Meeting, a number of projects underway were addressed: A) *Building*: the plumbing (hot water heater, water softener, and reverse osmosis unit) and HVAC (3 mini-splits and 2-ton heat pump compressor) have been installed and work wonderfully! Next up, replacement of the ceiling fans and changing light fixtures. B) *Playground*: a multi-purpose structure (slides, climb poles, nets, ramps: ages 5-12) has been ordered for installation in April, and a new area will be graded behind the swing-set for its installation, with a foot-deep layer of wood chips added overall. Also up: replacement of the chain link fence around the basketball court, new hoops and nets; C) *Architectural Feasibility Study*: several architects are now assessing the structural and cosmetic needs of the GCC. We should have a completed study in April.

The GCA election on March 7th (see p.1) will fill four GCA Board positions: three Director positions and the Treasurer.

The Census is coming! Look for a post-card in your mailbox around mid-March giving you options (a website link, a phone #) to complete the ten-question survey. Remember: every person not counted means \$3,700 in Federal funds goes to another community or to the State. New Mexico receives c.\$60 million in Federal funds for assistance programs. Senator Liz Stefanics

reports that a mere 1% under-count of New Mexico's population in 2020 would result in a \$780 million loss of federal funds over a 10-year period, so it is absolutely critical that we help ensure that everyone be counted. We need every dollar!

GUATEMALA

A kaleidoscope of warm tropical colors in a volcanic landscape with a population of 50% indigenous Maya speaking 21 Pre-Hispanic languages, embedded in a cultural and religious mosaic and woven into the bright fabric of an experience enough for two lifetimes – these define my recent trip to Guatemala.

This year I traveled once again to the pueblo of Santa Catarina Bobadilla on the outskirts of Antigua at the base of *El Volcan de Agua* to work as an interpreter for Baby's Breath Project* as part of a team prepared to train indigenous, rural midwives (*Comadronas*) in the use of the neonatal resuscitation bag and mask to assist babies born not breathing. We were a team of neonatal nurses, interpreters, and two Guatemalan doctors.

In twenty days, we taught, tested and certified 112 rural *Comadronas*, each of whom received a certificate and a Baby's Breath Backpack filled with the supplies necessary to put their training to use. Guatemalan *Comadronas* are estimated to attend 50 to 75% of births in indigenous populations. In Mayan culture their job is a sacred calling, as the skills are often passed down through generations within a family. These dedicated women are experienced and skilled in the home delivery of babies and care of the mother. However, without the training and supplies provided by Baby's Breath Project, a baby born not breathing has little chance at life.

For the second week, my team consisted of one English speaking nurse, her interpreter (me) translating her English to Spanish, and a second Guatemalan interpreter translating my Spanish to the K'iche-speaking midwives. The animated teaching and enthusiastic learning sprinkled with smiles, jokes, and laughter from nurses, midwives, and interpreters alike spoke to a surprising lack of language barriers. To the delight of the *Comadronas*, Shannon, my nurse partner, and I both learned to speak a few encouraging words in K'iche.

On Graduation Day, along with hugs, smiles and tears, we all expressed the joy of connections, friendship, and a job well done. For me the takeaway is that I've got friends in Guatemala and the "Comadronas" know they have friends in the United States. For this experience I am forever grateful.
