
### A HAPPY ENDING/FUTURE FOR THE GALISTEO PRESERVE

On July 31, *The New Mexican's* real estate columnist Kim Shanahan wrote "Galisteo Preserve's story is one to remember," detailing Ted Harrison's visionary founding of Commonweal Conservancy and its mission to create a full-scale conservation community just south of Lamy Hill. Originally an ambitious town plan with hundreds of homes, many of them affordable "workforce housing," plus schools, stores, etc., it provided a model for parts of the County's 2015 Sustainable Growth Management Plan.

Although a few high-end homes have been built, the 2008 real estate collapse doomed the new village. When the mortgage bill came due, the Eugene V. and Clare E. Thaw Charitable Trust saved the day, and land slated for development was put into conservation easements.

Many of us in Galisteo supported Harrison's initial vision (some didn't), looking forward to open land not divvied up into ranchettes like the recent development at Lamy, though of course the usual worries about water were a crucial part of the ongoing discussions. Happily for all of us, the beloved Preserve has survived and the final conservation easement is completed. The Thaw Trust has donated 4,730 acres to the recently formed Galisteo Basin Open Space Preserve and there will be no more homesites.

The preserve's 41 miles of trails are extremely popular; it is also a wildlife corridor for bears and cougars, and its minimal light pollution makes it a favored spot for local night sky watchers. What a treasure!

Fatal Wreck on NM 41: On Sept.27th, just before 8AM, one of the big double gravel dump trucks that have become ubiquitous through the village jack-knifed when turning from US 285 onto NM 41 where all the construction is happening. Speed was a factor. 41 was closed most of the day. Driver Asa Kae Lewis died from his injuries.

Former Galistean (and still GVFR member) **Billie Mitchell** participated in Currents this summer with an innovative video.


Larry Anaya, author and former Galistean, passed away recently in San Antonio, Texas.


